

Summit of Turk. (contd)

The summit of this mountain is of a conical form. It is an exceeding high mountain making an angle of elevation of about 60 degrees. The declivity on the S. side is not so great, and nothing but bare mountain, but on the North and East is a beautiful planting of Fir, Ash, Oak, and Elm.

This is a handsome thatched cottage 2 story high, beautifully shaded with shrubs and trees except on the North side by which it has a commanding view of the lower lake of Killarney. It was built by Lady Kenmare.

Situated in the Channel or boundary between the townlands of Glenaa, and Gurtracussan and near the meeting of the Waters.

This bridge has 2 arches, one of which is navigable for boats wherein gentlemen pass up and down on the Channel or Long range from Lower to Upper Lake of Killarney.

Situated in the South end of the townland of Gurtararee and near the S.E. point of Upper lake of Killarney.

This lodge is 35 links South of the new line of road leading from Killarney to Kenmare. There is a tower to this lodge 20 links square, 3 story high and handsomely built, the proprietor Henry A Herbert Esqr got it built for the Accomodation of gentlemen who visit the upper lake of Killarney at the expense of £200.
