Patients are admitted every day from 11 to 1 o'clock, upon application at the Hospital, with or without a letter of recommendation. The Hospital, which is wholly supported by a Parliamentary grant, and a grant in aid from the War Office, contains 100 beds, and has special wards for married women. The Institution is used not only as a means of curing physical disease, but as a reformatory for the moral reclamation of the patients, many of whom have, through the efforts of the respective chaplains and lady visitors of both religious denominations, been restored to their families, provided with employment in the Hospital, or persuaded to enter penitentiaries. 650 patients were admitted into the Institution (including 15 born) during the year ended 31st March, 1891.

This Hospital contains 50 beds, besides an extensive Dispensary, and is open to the poor without distinction of creed or locality. 691 in-patients and 5,498 out-patients were treated, and 630 operations were performed during the year ended 31st March, 1891.

Each out-patient, with the exception of paupers, is expected to pay 6d. per month for medicine and attendance. The out-patient department is open every week-day from 9 to 12 o'clock. Attendance of out-patients last year, 19,119. Operations are performed on Wednesdays and Saturdays.

Annual subscribers of £1 and upwards are entitled to recommend patients in humble circumstances for free admission and treatment both in the hospital wards and at the Dispensary. Donors of ten shillings may recommend one poor person for an Artificial Eye.

Benefactions in aid of the charity are earnestly solicited, and will be received at the hospital, and by the Registrar.

This Hospital was opened in 1876, for accidents and other surgical and medical cases. There is a large Dispensary (closed four months for want of funds) attached to the Hospital, open on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, from 9½ A.M. to 10½ A.M. This Hospital contains 50 beds, and is dependent for its support on the voluntary contributions of the public. The sick poor are admitted without religious distinction, 450 patients indoor and 7,337 outdoor patients were treated last year. Donations are earnestly requested.
