COOLOCK.

COOLOCK, a parish and village in the barony of the same name, Dublin county, four and three-quarter miles N.N.E. from the General Post Office, Dublin, comprising an area of 1,734 acres, of which five are occupied by the village. Population of village, 202. It is situated on the road to Malahide. It is studded with handsome seats and pretty villas, most of which command fine views of the bay of Dublin, and surrounding country. The Church in the village, dedicated to St. Brandon, is a neat edifice. The Roman Catholic Church is a very pretty building, in the later style, with a belfry over the entrance. The Parochial School, built by Sir Compton Domville, is maintained by subscription. It has a Constabulary Police Station, and Petty Sessions Court-house, &c.

CRUMLIN.

CRUMLIN, a parish and village in Uppercross barony, Dublin county, three and a-half miles S.W. from the General Post Office, Dublin, comprising an area of 1,817 acres, of which 21 are occupied by the village. Population of parish, 923; of village, 204, inhabiting 44 houses. In 1594, the village was burned by the Wicklow sept of the O'Tooles and Byrnes; and in 1690, part of the army of King William III. encamped here on their return from the Boyne; from which it is said that monarch issued his proclamation against the brass coin of James II. The Church is a plain building; the Roman Catholic Church a neat edifice. A Dispensary, a National School, and a Metropolitan Police Station are in the village.
